Were it not for my introduction to the clay pigeon, this story couldn't have been written; and possibly I wouldn't even be involved in the shooting sports industry.

Growing up in Marion County, Missouri, I don't recall ever having seen a clay pigeon, though we did have real pigeons in the barn; so my first glimpse was upon moving to Columbia, to attend the University of Missouri. Tigertown Trap and Skeet Club was located in the coal-mining strip pits, just north of town and a fellow student from back home invited me to shoot skeet one afternoon. I was hooked immediately; and apparently for life. Skeet shooting burns a lot of ammo and soon thereafter I bought a MEC reloader.

There was this long date with the Air Force for a few years after college and I shot mostly skeet at my bases in, Arkansas, Texas and South Dakota. One spring we put a team together and attended the Armed Forces Championships in Colorado Springs. On the first day I shot 100 straight (my first and only in registered competition), using an old Remington 11-48 in 12 gauge. The

second day I broke the first 50, then dropped one each in the last two rounds, to finish with a 198 of 200 – that was quite a confidence builder for a young man.

We started the business in 1977 and it was a very busy time for the next ten years. The British game of sporting clays made its way to America and what a grand game it

has been. We sponsored the Louise Mandrell and Charlton Heston celebrity shoots for a few years in the 90s and got to meet and shoot with movie stars like Charlton Heston, country singers like the Mandrel sisters and too many politicians to keep

track of.
